The Wayüü Culture

When vacations are near, many people start to think about where they are going to travel. Most of the time, people who live in cold weather decide to travel to the coast of Colombia. When they arrive there, they don't know how people live there or their traditions.

The Wayüü are an Indian tribe on the coast of the Caribbean Region. They have been living there for many years and today they have started to be recognized in many parts of Colombia for their traditional "Mochilas" (Bags that are made with twine of different colours).

The Wayüü live in places called "Rancherias" (traditional straw houses). These Rancherias are in the "Alta Guajira" (west of la Guajira). This zone is like a desert and really hot. Arriving there is not easy because there are few built highways and it's full of sand. When tourists go there usually they have to go in big cars.

They have a strange tradition, but at the same time an interesting culture. For example, women aren't allowed to leave their homes when they stop being girls, they cannot talk with men until their mom, aunts and cousins consider that they can do it. They are between 2 or 3 years in their houses without going out and in this time they learn things that will help them in the future.

Their clothes have particular characteristics, for example, women tend to wear light dresses that are called "mantas" and men tend to wear underwear that is called "Guayuco". Both women and men use "Guaireñas" (that are like sandals).

Knowing about the Wayüü culture is interesting because they are part of our country and we should identify with them, despite their culture having unusual things. They are Colombian like us and like in every region of Colombia, cultures are not the same.


